

Santa Cruz and Santa Clara County WUIs






There are many communities that are considered high fire risk.



Defensible Space

- Creates a safe area for firefighters to protect a home
- Defensible space reduces fuels
- Protects homes
- Helps keep forests healthy



Embers/Firebrands

Can be carried or blown a mile or more

dry and windy can be 5 miles

Extreme conditions:

Where do needle and leaf debris accumulate on your property?



WHAT IS ALERTSCC?

AlertSCC is a free, easy, and confidential emergency alerting service built on the Everbridge platform used by organizations around the world for their alerting needs. AlertSCC utilizes telephone voice, email, and SMS text to send alerts. For complete information visit the AlertSCC website.

The County of Santa Clara has purchased E-911 landline databases for AlertSCC. You must register directly with AlertSCC (via this website) to receive cell phone, email, and text alerts. AlertSCC is an integral piece of a comprehensive emergency communications system that the County and cities/towns use to communicate with the public during an emergency.

AlertSCC is provided by the County of Santa Clara for use by the county and its constituent cities: Campbell, Cupertino, Gilroy, Los Altos, Los Altos Hills, Los Gatos, Milpitas, Monte Sereno, Morgan Hill, Mountain View, Palo Alto, San Jose, Santa Clara, Saratoga, and Sunnyvale. AlertSCC is administered by the county's Office of Emergency Services in coordination with the county's 15 cities/towns.

Disclaimer: AlertSCC is effective and efficient, but you should not rely on it exclusively. This system supplements, rather than replaces, other communication methods used by emergency responders, both in person and through the use of other media. Television, radio and County/city websites will continue to broadcast important announcements as well. AlertSCC communications are dependent upon external providers such as your wireless carrier or e-mail delivery service. County of Santa Clara government cannot guarantee that notifications will be received by the intended recipient. Service costs from your carrier are your responsibility.



Be Prepared

- Create your family evacuation plan
- Assemble an emergency kit for each person and keep one in the car
- Have a fire extinguisher
- Know how to shut off gas, water and power
- Maintain emergency contact list
- Have a portable radio



Fill out your family plan worksheet


Family Communication Plan

- Designate someone out of state as contact
- Make sure children know own full name and parents full names
- Write down & update contact names and phone numbers
- ■Know how to access VM from alternate number
- Write down your meeting locations
- Meet with your family and go over the plan practice

Assemble your Go Bag


- ■3 day supply of food and water
- **■**Evacuation map and contact list
- Prescriptions/eyeglasses
- Extra keys/credit cards/cash/copies of important documents
- Change of clothes
- Flashlight/radio/ extra batteries
- Sanitation supplies
- Pet supplies & vaccine records





If time allows- take what else?

- Easily carried valuables
- Photos
- PC or hard drive
- Chargers



Keep a bag and the list of last minute things to grab somewhere handy

First Aid Kit

- Variety of bandages
- Antibiotic ointment
- Antiseptic wipes
- Tweezers
- Cold compress
- Gloves
- Gauze pads and roller bandages
- **■**Thermometer
- Speciality supplies ie. diabetes


Create your Evacuation Plan

- Designate 2 meeting locations
 - -One right outside home
 - One outside your neighborhood
- Know your escape routes
 - -From your home
 - -From your neighborhood
- Have an evacuation plan for pets and livestock
- Have a family communication plan




Evacuation Routes

Take direction from Fire Department and Sheriff as experts in each incident.



Keep up to date, check your city/county website periodically to update the plan.

Neighborhood Evacuation Routes



- Know your roads Explore your neighborhood
- Know all possible evacuation routes from your home
- Know which streets are dead ends
- Do not plan to use trails!



Pre-Evacuation steps – if time allows – Indoors

- Shut all windows and doors
- Locate your animals
- Move flammable furniture to the center of the room
- ■Shut off gas (and AC)-if advised in warning
- Leave your lights on
- Check your neighbors

Pre-Evacuation steps – if time allows – Outdoors

- Put flammable items, patio furniture etc, inside or far from structures
- ■Turn off propane tanks
- Move BBQ away from structures
- Connect garden hoses/leave sprinklers off
- ■Place a ladder by the corner of your home
- Leave driveway gates unlocked even open if possible

Garage Door & Vehicle

- ■Power may be out
- Manually open garage door
- Amount of gas in car





How to pack your car

Think about the items that you will be taking and how they will fit into your vehicle.



When it is time to leave

- Review your evacuation plan checklist
- Make sure your emergency kit is in your vehicle
- ■Cover up to protect yourself from embers
- ■Don't wait for an evacuation order if you feel threatened leave
